








WHAT DOES HIV DO?

- When a person has HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus), they have a weakened immune system.
- HIV attacks the body's natural defences by infecting the CD4 white blood cells.
- As the cells become infected and destroyed, the body becomes less able to defend itself against infections and diseases.
- The virus can allow serious illnesses to take hold such as pneumonia, other infections, cancers and damage to the brain.
- If it is not successfully treated with medication, (which is now available on the NHS) it can progress to AIDS.



Did you know?

The virus stays in the body for life. There are drugs and techniques to help prolong life. However, there is no known cure or vaccine. It can lead to death.

Did you know?

According to UNAIDS, there were approximately 38 million people living with HIV worldwide in 2020. An estimated 1.5 million people were newly infected.

What is the difference between HIV and AIDS?

HIV

AIDS

HIV is a virus that attacks white blood cells (CD4) in the body's immune system.

If Untreated

AIDS is severe damage to the immune system from untreated HIV, leading to life-threatening infections and cancers.

Anti-viral medication can

prevent AIDS from Condeveloping.

If Untreated

AIDS is the final stage of HIV and cannot be treated.

You can have HIV and never develop AIDS.

Previously

Everyone who has AIDS has previously had HIV.

With effective treatment, nearly a full life expectancy.





Life expectancy once AIDS has fully developed is up to 3 years.



According to statistics, young people are at a higher risk of HIV infection. In 2020, 1 in 4 new HIV infections occurred amongst adolescents and young adults aged 15-24 years.

Despite significant progress in HIV prevention and treatment, stigma and discrimination continue to be major barriers to accessing HIV services. This is particularly for marginalized communities such as men who have sex with men, sex workers, and people who inject drugs.




