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Safeguarding

All our staff are supported in their duty to safeguard our students and do so in line with our Safeguarding and Child Protection policy. This does include specific guidance on all forms of abuse, including peer on peer and sexual. This policy is reviewed annually by Red Kite Learning Trustees and, considering the current circumstances, this policy has recently been reviewed and will be republished on our website shortly with a summary document for parents.

Education

We also understand our role to support the education of young people. Our Relationship and Sex Education curriculum, which is delivered through our Curriculum for Life subject, involves a combination of sharing information, exploring issues and values. This supports our students to be independent whilst considering others, acting responsibly, safely, and sensitively so that both they and the wider society benefit.

Support

Our values also mean that we have a collective responsibility to speak and act with kindness and to have mutual respect. With this we must feel confident to be honest when we see and hear actions or words that are not faithful to these values. All our students are encouraged to report any actions or words that go against our values, which they have seen, heard or experienced. They will be seen by a member of staff who will take appropriate steps following our Anti – Bullying Policy. Students can, of course, speak with any adult in school about any concerns they have.

The Department for Education has commissioned the NSPCC to establish a dedicated independent helpline for people who have experienced sexual abuse in educational settings.

The helpline went live on 1st April, and will provide both children and adults who have experienced sexual abuse in schools with support and advice, including onward action such as contacting the police if they wish to. The helpline will also provide support to parents and professionals. Anyone who gets in touch through this dedicated helpline will also be signposted to other relevant support services available, including Childline, which provides ongoing support and counselling to children and young people.
